So, why are we in Lockdown - AGAIN


We all had hoped that because the virus infection rates had receded during the summer that we would be able to carry on, with restrictions, through the Winter. Unfortunately to my mind it come down to one thing The Percentage of Asymptomatic Cases.

According to the <u>latest research from the CDC</u>, 40% of all infections are asymptomatic. The CDC also say that this 40% pass on 75% of all infections.

This means, that you are <u>three times</u> as likely to catch COVID-19 from a person **showing no signs of infection** as you are from a person showing infection.


Without proper SOCIAL DISTANCING people play <u>Russian Roulette</u> with the virus. Every close contact outside <u>your support</u> <u>bubble</u> increases the probability that the person you meet is infectious but asymptomatic. Here in Gloucestershire, Stroud area cases have increased <u>69% in the last 7 days</u>. We are still BELOW the National average, but the "confirmed" case numbers are now rising steeply.

AND REMEMBER for every 10 confirmed cases, there are 4 more walking around who don't know they have it!

COVID Update October


Latest Numbers

The BBC and others are fixated on UK news. Are we SO insular these days? Looking at the <u>Worldwide COVID-19 Dashboard</u> I see that not only has the 40M case number been passed but the 400K

new cases per day also. The whole of the EU (and UK) is also now in the midst of a second "wave". In March the peak was at the 30K per day level at present it's 115K per day.

Of course this is not the whole story as most people in March were not tested, so the estimated daily infection rate for March is probably higher than now.

Worrying Trend for the UK

However, behind the current statistics is a worrying trend. So whilst the current estimated daily infection rate for the UK is around 17.5K per day, well short the peak 100K per day in March, unless something drastic is done in the UK this could rise to <u>85K by the end of the year</u>. This would also mean that

the same number of ICU beds that we needed in May would be needed in January. Unfortunately we are due to <u>run out of ICU beds</u> in early November.....

The size of Coronavirus

Just how large is a single Coronavirus?

I came across this diagram of the relative size of the Coronavirus on the website <u>Visual Capitalist</u>. It shows the size of coronavirus compared with other particles like dust, pollen, hair, salt and sand etc. The fascinating thing was how small smoke and droplets from breath can be.
